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NIC and PCU-WHS Offer New Degree Pathway for Human Services Students

Graduates of NIC Human Services programs have new opportunities to complete a degree at Pacific Coast University for Workplace Health Sciences, thanks to a new agreement signed this fall between the two institutions.

The block transfer agreement provides NIC Human Services and Social Services graduates up to 45 transfer credits in the University's Bachelor of Disability Management degree.

"This agreement establishes a new career track for NIC students," said NIC President John Bowman, "Students who had planned on working as an education assistant in schools, or in the social services field, can now complete their NIC program and move into a very specialized career."

The four-year applied degree prepares graduates to enter the growing field of disability management – either helping under-employed workers directly, or, assisting employers, insurers and service organizations as they introduce cost-effective and responsive disability management and return-to-work programs. Designed as an online program, the degree offers students the flexibility to study on their own schedules.

There is an ever-increasing need for individuals with education and experience in the disability management and return-towork fields due to an aging workforce, increased awareness of mental health challenges and the development of national and provincial accessibility legislation. In 2010, Canada ratified the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, which includes a requirement for all employers to have effective return to work programs in place.

"Increasing the number of highly skilled individuals in the return to work or disability management arena as job opportunities emerge, changes the narrative for persons with disabilities," said Wolfgang Zimmermann, President, Pacific Coast University for Workplace Health Sciences. "With almost 1.2 million Canadians with a disability living in poverty, maintaining gainful and productive employment following the onset of a disabling condition is key towards continued full financial and social participation."
